



UK-REACH questionnaire in numbers

Interim analyses: We have now pulled all of the data from the first questionnaire, thank you to all of those who participated. We are in the process of analysing this huge dataset and will be publishing data on a number of different themes shortly. This includes which healthcare roles have been at greatest risk of infection and the impact of the pandemic on both the physical and mental health of healthcare workers. We also have a pre-print out which looks at the reasons healthcare workers may not be confident to take up a vaccine at this time (more on this over the page).

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Vaccine Hesitancy

Much media attention has been focused on the vaccine rollout and reasons for lower vaccine uptake in some groups. The UK-REACH team have been looking at data collected from our questionnaires, and interviews and focus groups with healthcare workers, to understand the reasons for this.

Analysis of interim questionnaire data has found nearly a quarter of healthcare workers were hesitant about COVID-19 vaccines. Hesitancy was greater in some ethnic groups; in women - especially pregnant women; in younger healthcare workers; and in those who had previously tested positive for COVID-19. Being less positive about vaccines in general, having lower trust in employers, and greater belief in COVID conspiracies were also predictors of hesitancy.

The qualitative research has provided important insight into the accessibility and trustworthiness of health information and messaging, the role that trust and perceived risk play in influencing decisions about the vaccine, and ways of moving forward.



Policy Report on the legal and ethical implications of analysing large healthcare datasets

Two of our researchers, Edward Dove and Ruby Reed-Berendt, from the University of Edinburgh, have published a policy report on the legal and ethical issues arising from the collection and use of health care workers' data which includes a series of recommendations.

"Our report aims to chart a path for UK-REACH (and projects like it) to use and link sensitive data in a way that is legally, ethically and socially acceptable".
